- The Moon has a thin atmosphere called an exosphere, consisting of atoms bouncing on its surface.

Addressing Oil Spills

Marie Curie was a trailblazing physicist and chemist who made groundbreaking contributions to our understanding of the universe. Her work on radioactivity led to a deeper understanding of the structure of atoms and paved the way for major advances in medicine, energy, and industry.

Born in Warsaw, Poland, Marie was the fifth of seven children in her family. Her family fostered, in her, a love for learning and her father, a physics teacher, served as an inspiration to pursue her interest in science and mathematics. Unfortunately, women's educational opportunities were barred

in Poland at that time, but Marie's determination and passion drove her to attend the "Flying University"(a secret institution for women) for her secondary education. Marie and Pierre Curie (her husband) worked together in physics and shared her first Nobel prize in 1903. Marie continued her research even after her husband died and became the first woman to be appointed as a professor at the University of Paris. A few years later Marie won her second Nobel prize (becoming the first person to win two Nobel prizes in different fields) for her work on the isolation of pure radium, which was a major achievement at the time. Marie Curie died on July 4th, 1934, at the age of 66, in Passy, France. The official cause of death was listed as aplastic anaemia (which she was diagnosed with in 1933), likely caused by her prolonged exposure to radioactive materials. Despite facing significant obstacles due to her gender, Curie's dedication to science and her perseverance in the face of adversity have made her an enduring symbol of scientific excellence. She is remembered as a pioneer and her legacy continues to inspire scientists, researchers, and women around the world, promoting STEM education and encouraging others to pursue careers in science.


