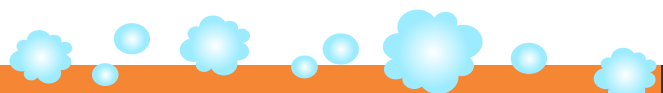

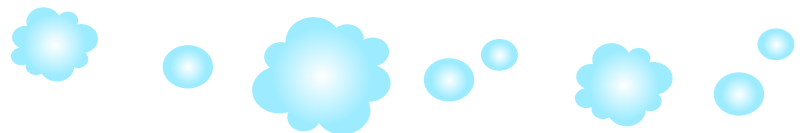

Personality of the month

Ghulam Muhammad Zaz is an artist from Kashmir, India. He is known for making Santoor and other hand-crafting traditional musical instruments. He is known to be the last Santoor maker of Kashmir. On 26 January 2023, he was honoured with Padma Shri, the fourth-highest civilian award in India. He was born in 1941, in the Zaina Kadal area of Srinagar. He has been making traditional Kashmiri musical instruments like Santoor, Rabab and Sarangi since 1953. He is the last and the 8th generation of the family and is known for making the finest santoor in the valley over the past many decades. He proudly says that he will continue to make the finest Santoor as long as he is alive. He recalled one of the events where a well-wisher of his family had predicted that the art of Santoor making in the Zaz family would last only for seven generations. "I am the 8th generation. The legacy is trembling and it will end with me," he said while adding that the instruments they make will not be found anywhere in India. He had recently made a santoor, which is a trapezoid-shaped instrument. It is maroon coloured with 87 strings and 28 bridges. Originally Kashmiri Santoor had 100 strings. When it came to Indian Classical Music, the numbers of strings were reduced. The strings are fixed with the bridges. It is beautified with Shikargah designs (a design of trees and birds) made on the top of it and colourful paper mâché designs on every side. At the top, it mentions Rehman Joo Zaz & Sons, manufacturers and dealers of all kinds of musical instruments. He said, "I work very hard so that my customers should get good instruments from me. I have good customers by the grace of God, who patiently wait for their orders. I work when I am in the mood." He learnt the art of making Santoor from his grandfather, Rahman Joo and father, AbdulAhad Zaz.

The second and final School Management meeting for the session 2023-24 was conducted. The agenda for the day was discussed. The Principal thanked all the members for their valuable input throughout the year.

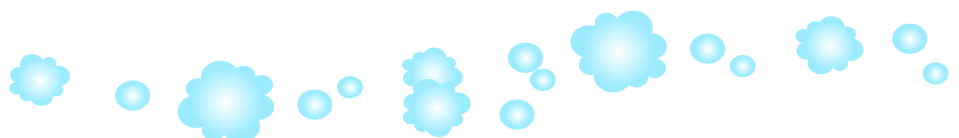
