



## Personality of the month

Aruna Asaf Ali (Maiden name - Aruna Ganguly), born in 1909 on the 16th July in present day Haryana into a Bengali family. These were times when education of women was largely withheld and proper employment more so, Ganguly was a graduate and worked as well, with her first job being that of a teacher at a school in Calcutta. By nature, she was very rebellious, marrying Asaf Ali, who was not only much older than her but also Muslim, both of which were attributes detested by her parents.

Soon into her matrimony, she became very active in the INC, a member of which was her husband, Asaf Ali. She was a fiery leader who plunged headlong into politics at a time when the freedom struggle was raging, and she was known as the 'Grand Old Lady' of the Independence Movement. At the time when all INC leaders were jailed, she was the one to hoist the Indian tricolour at the Azad Maidan, Bombay in 1942 and thus commenced the Quit India Movement. However, little after this, the Colonial Government. took draconian actions, such as seizing and auctioning all of her property, which compelled her to go underground. During that time, she edited Inquilab alongside Ram Manohar Lohia. Her rebellious nature showed itself when she defied Gandhi's request to peacefully surrender



and live a normal life and continued to remain underground. Post-Independence, in 1958 she was elected as Delhi's first female mayor. Soon after, she became a member of the CPI, later rejoining the Congress, where she remained an aide of Indira Gandhi despite being critical of Emergency. At the grand old age of 87, she passed away in 1996, and the 'Grand Old Lady' left the mortal plane, for heavenly pastures.
